II. Presentations	Cecilia Miller presented on the unique environment and risk factors for suicide that are present in veterinarians. Veterinarians have four times the rate of suicide than the general population	
Veterinary Suicide	and two times that of medical/dental professionals. There is ongoing research regarding the high levels of stress in the profession, poor work environment, financial stress and easy access	
Cecilia Miller SAVE	to and knowledge of lethal means. Risk factors include but are not limited to compassion fatigue, overwhelming and irregular hours, expectations and demands of clients and lack of resources to deal with stress. Cecilia presented some research findings including that one in six veterinarians have considered suicide and suggestions that euthanasia and ideas about humanity and end of life may be a factor for the high suicide rates. Some suggestions presented to reduce suicides among veterinarians include QPR training which is free for AVMA members, focusing on the practice vs. practice and the business, work-life balance, locked and double-monitored medications and overall education and awareness among the profession.
