	 Lethal Means The next meeting is May 12. The subcommittee has finalized the letter for firearm retailers. The initial training tool that will be offered to firearm retailers has changed from QPR to the AFSP and National Shooting Sports Foundation (NSSF) "Talk Saves Lives" program, which was just released. QPR may be offered as another option in the future. Once this initiative is rolled out, the subcommittee will focus on lethal means restriction for poisoning. 	
	 Student Well-Being An alert on the Blue Whale Challenge will be sent to the listserv this afternoon. This is an app specifically designed to bully users into 50 days of self-harm and encourages suicide. It is NOT a game. 	 Suicide-related Federal Grants DMHAS submitted an application for the National Strategy for Suicide Prevention (NSSP) grant. This is a highly competitive grant (four awardees). If DMHAS receives the grant, it will focus predominately on DMHAS state-operated facilities The Department of Public Health, in conjunction with DMHAS and DCF, has taken the lead on a Collaborative Improvement and Innovation Network (CoIIN) initiative for youth suicide prevention. The initiative is led by the Health Resources and Services Administration. For this CoIIN, the focus will be on reducing the call abandonment rate of those who call into the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline in Connecticut.
