Review of Minutes and	Suzi Craig, Senior Director of Advocacy and Development of Mental Health Connecticut, discussed the organizations beginning's and current objectives. Mental Health Connecticut is concerned with three main goals: advocacy, education and services. Though the organization does not directly have programming or initiatives specifically focused on suicide, suicide prevention is "built into the DNA" of the organization. For example, within 30 days of working with an individual, a trauma screening and intervention plan is conducted. Populations served are young adults and adults, with a majority of their programs housing-focused. Updates	<ul> <li>Foundations         Jordan Porco Foundation         The 6<sup>th</sup> Annual Gala will be held on March 25, 2017 at the Foxwoods Resort and Casino.     </li> <li>The foundation is currently in the process of revamping the "4 What's Next" program. They hired a curriculum writer from CREC and are looking at how the model could be included within youth service bureaus, youth diversion programs and youth faith groups.</li> <li>Nine Out Of Ten now includes a Youth Ambassadors program. It is a peer-to-peer</li> </ul>	

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	program designed to provide students with information on suicide prevention that they can disseminate to other students. As part of the ambassador program, there is a new website and incentive component for ambassadors.  • The foundation works closely with the Connecticut Injury Prevention Center to evaluate their programs.	
	American Foundation for Suicide Prevention (AFSP)  • A total of 6 volunteers and 2 staff members from both AFSP Connecticut Chapters will attend the National AFSP Leadership Conference in Irvine, CA.	
	• The Hartford charter is working with the New London charter on a May event.  Currently, they are deciding between two venues and will provide further information when available.	
	<ul> <li>Committees</li> <li>Armed Forces-Community Health Promotion Council         <ul> <li>The peer to peer program is still in development.</li> <li>There is no meeting in January.</li> </ul> </li> <li>Data and Surveillance         <ul> <li>Celeste Jorge reported that the committee met with the CT Poison Control Center to review their available data as they have an independent database and unique set of data. They discussed the high rates of poisoning attempts and deaths in the state. Amy Hanoian Fontana from the CT Poison Control Center will be joining the committee. Tim Marshall reported that there may be an opportunity for safe messaging and means restrictions around over-the-counter medications that individuals don't usually think to lock up.</li> <li>The committee also discussed how the Poison Control database does not link up with other databases to follow an individual who has been hospitalized for a poisoning. Due to confidentiality laws, it is difficult to track an individual through systems to see the outcome of their hospitalization. Tim Marshall suggested investigating if there are some data tables that can be run annually and to look throughout the state at databases that may be useful. He said the goal of the committee is to find out what data is available and to get it automated.</li> <li>Rob Aseltine from UCONN Health will create a single fact sheet that combines the adult data and the youth data that discusses suicide attempts and deaths from poising.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	

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	Intervention-Postvention Response      There is no meeting this month. A conference call may be planned.      Tom Steen reported that there are more reports from AFSP support groups of people showing up with the folder that funeral homes give out after an untimely death.	
	<ul> <li>Lethal Means</li> <li>Tim Marshall discussed movements on the suicide prevention displays for the gun shops. After looking over the safe gun messaging material from the National Shooting Sports Foundation, the committee will brand the material from the CTSAB with the "1 Word" logo.</li> <li>Tim Marshall and Andrea Duarte clarified the goal and purpose of the group. They emphasized that the Lethal Means Committee is not only limited to firearms; it is focused on all lethal means.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>Student Well-Being</li> <li>Tim Marshall thanked Celeste Jorge and Amanda Pickett for their leadership with the committee and reminded board members that the campaign is to raise awareness for school personnel, primarily teachers.</li> <li>Celeste Jorge thanked the individuals who provided feedback on the suicide prevention resource card and accompanying companion document for educators in the state. Additionally, she answered questions regarding the audience of the card; she explained that its purpose is to be used for teachers to refer a student to the appropriate resource in school.</li> <li>Celeste Jorge extended an invitation for others to join the committee—especially for those who work with youth or in a school environment.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>Zero Suicide</li> <li>A total of 17 systems in the state have incorporated Zero Suicide into their organization and are part of the learning community.</li> <li>The Committee is currently waiting to hear back as to whether they were accepted to as a conference presenter at the American Association of Suicidology Conference.</li> <li>Kenyatta Thompson, MSW intern with DMHAS, is creating a crosswalk between the elements of zero suicide and The Joint Commission's Sentinel Event Alert: "Detecting and Treating Suicide Ideation in All Settings."
